





Chief Bradley Rinehimer

Chief Rinehimer has been with James City County Police Department since 1995. He has served for the last seven years as the Division Commander for Community Services, Administrative Services, Colonial Community Corrections and Records.

Chief Rinehimer has worked in most areas of the department and has been in a number of positions, to include Patrol Officer, School Resource Officer, Community Services Officer, Assistant SWAT Team Commander, and Community Services Lieutenant. He also served as Commander for both the Uniform and Investigations divisions.

During his police career, Chief Rinehimer successfully completed a Bachelor's degree program in Criminology from St. Leo University. He also completed a Master's degree program through the University of Cincinnati. Chief Rinehimer is a graduate of the 234th session of the FBI National Academy, the FBI's Law Enforcement Executive Development Seminar, and the VACP/VCPF Professional Executive Leadership School at the University of Richmond.

Prior to joining James City County Police Department, Chief Rinehimer served four years in the United States Navy as a Submarine Nuclear Propulsion Plant Mechanical Operator.

Deputy Chief Stan Stout

Deputy Chief Stout has been with James City County Police Department since 1989. In addition to being the Deputy Chief of Police, he serves as the Uniform Division Commander. For seven years prior to this assignment, Deputy Chief Stout was the Commander of the Investigations Division. Deputy Chief Stout also served as the department's Public Information Officer for three years and as the Internal Affairs Coordinator.

Deputy Chief Stout has worked in both patrol and investigations. He has also been the Commander of the department's SWAT Team, and the supervisor of the Midnight and Day Shifts. Deputy Chief Stout was assigned to the Colonial Narcotics Enforcement Task Force and worked narcotics and vice for five years prior to being promoted to the rank of Lieutenant and returning to the Uniform Division.

Deputy Chief Stout holds a Bachelor of Science degree in Biology from the Virginia Military Institute and a Master of Science degree in the Administration of Criminal Justice from Troy University. Deputy Chief Stout is also a graduate of the University of Richmond's Professional Executive Leadership School and FBI's Law Enforcement Executive Development Seminar. Prior to coming to James City County, Chief Stout served in the United States Army as an Airborne Ranger Infantry Officer and reached the rank of Major.

Deputy Chief Stout is currently serving on the Middle Peninsula Juvenile Detention Commission and on the Colonial Area Family and Intimate Partner Violence Fatality Review Team. Deputy Chief Stout received the honor of James City County's "Police Officer of the Year" Award in 1992 and the Daughter of the American Revolution "Police Officer of the Year" Award in 1995.

Major Stephen Rubino

Major Rubino has been with James City County Police Department since 1987 and currently serves as the Investigations Division Commander. He is the department's Public Information Officer and Internal Affairs Coordinator.

Major Rubino has also been in charge of the Uniform Division and the Community & Administrative Services Division. He has served as a Police Officer, Senior Police Officer, and Investigator. He has been a Sergeant assigned to Uniform Patrol on Day Shift and a Lieutenant on Evening Shift. He has been a member of the department's SWAT Team and has served as a Sniper, Assistant Commander and Team Commander. He holds many specialty instructor certifications to include ASP Baton, Chemical Weapons, Firearms, Homeland Defense and Less Lethal.

Major Rubino has a Master's degree in Criminal Justice from Troy University, a Bachelor's degree in Criminology from St. Leo University and an Associate's degree in Police Science from Thomas Nelson Community College. He is a graduate of the FBI National Academy, the Virginia Forensic Science Academy, and the Professional Executive Leadership School at the University of Richmond. He previously served in the United States Air Force as a Law Enforcement Specialist.

Major Anthony G. "Tony" Dallman has worked for the James City County Police Department since 1995. He started his career in the Uniform Division and after 5 years as a patrol officer, he was promoted to Sergeant and then Lieutenant in 2001, and was promoted to Major in April 2014. He has spent a total of 8 years as a supervisor in the Uniform Division on all three patrol shifts, and 6 years as the Community Services Unit supervisor.

Major Dallman has served in a variety of roles in the Department including Patrol Officer, Radar Instructor, Taser Instructor, Field Training Officer, Internal Affairs Investigator, and Crisis Negotiator. He is a Certified Crime Prevention Specialist. In his current assignment, he is the Community and Administrative Services Division Commander.

Major Dallman has a bachelor's degree in Physics from Mary Washington College and completed his Master's Degree in Criminal Justice in 2013. He is a graduate of the Virginia Police Chief's Foundation Professional Executive Leadership School and will be attending the 257th session of the FBI National Academy in the summer of 2014.

Over the last year, Master Officer Sterling Perry has shown his dedication to the department and has exemplified himself as a team player; this is witnessed by his strong ability and his willingness to assist others. A prime example is when Evening Shift experienced a shortage of officers for a time during the last year. Officer Perry was one of the most-willing officers to volunteer to stay late, sometimes several times in a week and sometimes coming in to assist on his days off. He recently competed and was selected to fill an opening on the Traffic Unit. He also went through motorcycle training and is now one of only 6 motor officers within the department. Since joining the Traffic Unit, Officer Perry goes above and beyond, particularly in his drive to assist others. He always monitors the radio and often volunteers to assist on any and every type of priority or emergency call. He has also continued to serve as a SWAT team member and is always available for tactical operations regardless of the time of day or night.

Officer Perry also displays dedication in the way in which he investigates his own cases and in the way in which he assists Investigations. He is often sought out by Investigators whenever they have high-risk search or arrest warrants. In the past year, he has also shown talent and ability in the development and use of informants.

He has also participated in several community-based fundraising events while on his own time. 



IBR Offenses 2013

Incident Based Reporting (IBR) captures all actual (excluding unfounded) offenses known to police, which is different from Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) where only the most serious crimes are captured by using the Hierarchy Rule. This report may not be identical to the information in the Crimes in Virginia report because of the reporting guidelines set by the state.

By IBR standards all known crimes are either Group A or Group B Offenses. Clearances are reported only in Group A Offenses. The next sections show all known crimes by offense group.







The James City County Police Department is recognized as a satellite training facility of the Hampton Roads Criminal Justice Training Academy.


Annually we provide personnel basic, refresher and specialized training in topics such as:

- Empty hand self-defense and physical control techniques







Project Lifesaver 4th Annual Car Show

May 4, 2013 - The Project Lifesaver Car Show is hosted by the police department with support from many community businesses with all proceeds going toward the Project Lifesaver Program. Project Lifesaver was established in 1999 as an initiative for the 43rd Virginia Search and Rescue Company of the Chesapeake Sheriff's Office. Its mission is to use tracking technology to locate victims of Alzheimer's and Related Mental Disorders (ARMD), including autism, and others who are at high risk of wandering. Project Lifesaver places personalized radio transmitters on those identified with these types of conditions. The transmitters assist local agencies in helping locate victims if they ever become lost.

Nationally there have been 2,619 lives saved and credited to Project Lifesaver. The average locating time is 30 minutes. Currently the program is used by 1200 agencies in the USA, Canada and Australia. In 2013, James City County had 42 clients. The Police department visits each client on a monthly basis to change out the batteries in the transmitters. This program is funded by fundraisers and donations and is a free service to those living in a private residence as long as funds remain available. The service is also available for those residing in assisted living facilities although there is a fee charged to the facility for these clients.

“Every 30 Minutes” DUI Education

May 2013 - This national program is an interactive two-day event that educates high school students by identifying problems associated with their driving, socializing and alcohol-related activities. It is the intent of this program to help the individual student understand that their behavior has a rippling effect on those around them: family, friends, classmates, etc. The program’s name was derived from the fact that every thirty minutes in the United States at least one person is killed as a result of an alcohol-related incident to include alcohol-related traffic crashes. We work in partnership with the Williamsburg/James City County Public School System, many other agencies, and local businesses to create a “mock” fatal crash involving alcohol. The program involves the local hospital, courthouse, funeral home and fire departments. Parents and friends of the participants are involved in the two-day event.

The end result is shocking for all involved. The impact created by this project is both educational and everlasting. The emotions that are expressed during the assembly on the following day where obituaries are read and memories are shared touch every student attending the assembly. Everyone gets to view the video from the previous day and listen to guest speakers share their experiences.

It is our hope that this program will touch the lives of all who attend and possibly prevent the senseless death of one priceless life. The police department has received overwhelming support from all who are involved and it is our desire to make this project a continued annual event.



Sarah Panzau

May 2013 - School Resource Officer Ian Demodna worked to raised \$3,000 to have Sarah Panzau give presentations at both Lafayette High School and Jamestown High Schools.

On August 23, 2003 at the age of 27, Sarah Panzau was involved in a near-fatal car crash. After partying and drinking, she drove her car. She ran off of the road, struck a guardrail and sustained numerous life-threatening injuries. She had a list of injuries two pages long and spent 6 weeks in the hospital. Sarah also lost her left arm in the crash. She had a Blood Alcohol Concentration (BAC) of .30 on the night of the crash. Listen to Sarah's story:

Child Safety Seat Inspections



C.O.P.s Camp



James City Police start enforcement campaign to reduce rear-end crashes

JAMES CITY — Reducing rear-end collisions, the leading type of crash in James City County, is the focus of a two-month campaign by county police.

"We are doing this campaign because I've noticed over the last few years that rear-end crashes are the number one type of crashes in the county," said Master Police Officer Leslie Sten.

In 2012, there were 213 rear-end accidents in the county. So far, 151 have occurred this year. Sten said the high numbers of rear-end accidents prompted the enforcement initiative.

She said police know the areas where this type of crash is prevalent and are targeting those areas, which include the Monticello Avenue and Longhill Road. According to a press release, rear-end accidents typically happen along both roads and are usually caused by following too closely or distracted driving.
